- 1 A. I pled guilty because I am guilty.
- 2 **Q.** What did you do?
- 3 **A.** I was charged with and I did admit to robbing individuals
- 4 and selling drugs and guns.
- 5 Q. You robbed individuals, sold drugs and guns; is that what
- 6 you said?
- 7 A. Yes. Yes, sir.
- 8 Q. In what kinds of situations did you rob people?
- 9 A. While I was working in a law enforcement capacity.
- 10 Q. And while you were working in a law enforcement capacity,
- 11 | what circumstances did you find these people?
- 12 **A.** During car stops and search warrants.
- 13 | Q. Did you also on one occasion commit a robbery while not
- 14 | acting as a Baltimore police officer?
- 15 A. Yes, sir. On two occasions where -- one incident where I
- 16 was informed by another colleague or ex-colleague of mines,
- 17 Gondo, of -- of one of his friends having -- knowing someone
- 18 | who had drugs and a large amount of cash in their house.
- 19 And, also, on another occasion where I did do a
- 20 search warrant and I found out that the people had money, and I
- 21 | wound up going back to their house and getting two other people
- 22 | that weren't police officers to go in there acting as police
- 23 officers to rob the individuals.
- 24 | Q. Mr. Rayam, we'll go into both of those episodes here
- 25 shortly.

- When you committed robberies, did you act alone? 1 2 No. Α. Who did you rob people with? 3 At the time Wayne Jenkins, Hersl, Taylor, Ward, Gondo, 4 5 myself, and Sergeant, at the time, Allers, and also a couple other associates. 6 7 So the names you just listed were members of the Q. Gun Trace Task Force? 8 9 Yes. Α. Q. You robbed --10 11 MR. PURPURA: Objection, Judge. Can we approach the bench at this time? 12 13 THE COURT: Okay. 14 MR. PURPURA: Thank you. 15 (Bench conference on the record: 16 MR. PURPURA: This is what we litigated about before 17 we filed a motion in limine on the issue of the Government 18 overusing the word "robbery." And that's going to be --19 whether an incident is a robbery or not a robbery is going to 20 be decided by the jury. That's number one. 21 And here they're leading as to what these incidents are; and that's what I thought they were not supposed to do, 22 23 saying that they're robberies.
 - If he thinks it's a robbery, he can say it's a robbery. But the Government shouldn't be saying it's a

- 14 Q. What is the maximum?
- 15 **A.** 20 years.
- 16 **Q.** Are you in jail right now?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 Q. Why is that?
- 19 A. I was considered a threat by the courts to -- to the
- 20 community.
- 21 Q. I'd like to ask you, first, some questions about your
- 22 | background.
- 23 Mr. Rayam, where did you grow up?
- 24 A. I grew up in Newark, New Jersey.
- 25 Q. And when did you come to Maryland?

- 1 **A.** In July of 2005.
- 2 Q. How far have you gone in school?
- 3 **A.** I got a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing.
- 4 Q. From where?
- 5 A. DeSales University in Pennsylvania.
- 6 Q. When did you start working for the Baltimore Police
- 7 Department?
- 8 A. My -- I started working July 12th of 2005.
- 9 Q. When did you become a detective?
- 10 **A.** Approximately somewhere around 2007.
- 11 **Q.** When were you arrested?
- 12 **A.** March 1st of 2017.
- 13 **Q.** Prior to your arrest, what was your most recent unit or
- 14 assignment?
- 15 **A.** I was assigned to the Gun Trace Task Force.
- 16 Q. When were you assigned to the Gun Trace Task Force?
- 17 **A.** Roughly around 2011.
- 18 **Q.** Now, a moment ago you testified that you committed a
- 19 robbery with Gondo, is that right --
- 20 **A.** Yes.
- 21 **Q.** -- involving drugs?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 **Q.** Where was that robbery committed?
- 24 A. Marnat Road, 2835 Marnat Road. And it was an apartment,
- 25 | and I actually used to live adjacent to that apartment.

- 1 Q. You used to live in the apartment next door?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 **Q.** How was this episode planned?
- 4 A. Gondo had contacted me and told me that a friend of his
- 5 | who I knew from another occasion and had told -- well, Gondo
- 6 | told me that his friend had told him that this individual had
- 7 | large sums of money, about, like, seventy, eighty thousand
- 8 dollars or so in his house, and they wanted to run in there and
- 9 qet it.
- And they called me and asked me, you know -- well, Gondo
- 11 | had called me and asked me if I wanted to do it. And I told
- 12 him, "Yeah, I'll do it."
- 13 | Q. How did you set this up?
- 14 **A.** We -- Gondo and I, we set it up by placing a tracker on
- 15 | the person's vehicle so we can know where he's at at all times.
- 16 And the plan was to go in there when no one was there.
- 17 **Q.** Who did you get the tracker from?
- 18 **A.** At the time it was from Clewell. He was in our unit at
- 19 the time. I got it from another person in our unit.
- 20 Q. That's John Clewell?
- 21 **A.** John Clewell, yes.
- 22 | Q. Did you put the tracking device on the target?
- 23 **A.** Yes. I put it on the target's vehicle.
- 24 | Q. Did you ultimately break into the apartment on Marnat?
- 25 **A.** Yes. Myself and Mr. Kyle had -- I went up there, and I

- pushed the door in. And once I went inside, I went into the bedroom. And I noticed that it was a female in there, and I was somewhat startled. And I was armed and I had pointed my gun. And I -- I could have told her I would kill her or I could have told her a lot of things just to scare her into telling me where the money was at, and at the time she told me
- 8 Q. Did you take items during this home invasion?

it was in the "chester" drawer.

- 9 A. Yes. She pointed to the "chester." And I went over and I
 10 saw a chain -- well, it was money in the drawer, and it was a
 11 gun. I took that and the money and also a chain and a Rolex.
- 12 **Q.** The money and the other items that were taken, were they ultimately sold and split up amongst you guys?
- A. Yes. And Mr. Kyle, he had to -- drugs, about -approximately about 800 grams of drugs. And, yeah, in all, we
 wound up -- Mr. Kyle wound up selling the drugs and the gun and
 the watch.
- 18 **Q.** As part of your cooperation, did you provide the 19 United States information about this episode?
- 20 A. Yes. I told the prosecution about what I did.
- 21 **Q.** And did you testify at a jury trial?
- 22 **A.** Yes.

- Q. Now, you mentioned there was another home invasion. Who did that involve? Who were the victims of that home invasion?
- 25 **A.** I can't remember the victim's name, but the people that

- were with me was my -- my cousin and a friend of mines from -and myself.
- 3 **Q.** What did the victims do for a living?
- A. They had -- they owned a birdseed company -- a birdseed store where they just provided bird -- food for birds.
- 6 Q. How did you learn about the birdseed store?
- 7 A. There was a -- we had conducted a search warrant on the 8 property and supposedly -- the individuals were supposed to
- 9 have a gun, but they didn't have a gun. But at the time I had
- 10 noticed that they had the -- well, they were -- I -- at the
- 11 | time I noticed that they had cash, and I came to find out that
- 12 | it was \$20,000 worth of cash.
- 13 **Q.** So this was -- it started as a search with you and members
- 14 of your unit?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 Q. And then what did you do with the cash when you saw it at
- 17 | the birdseed store?
- 18 **A.** Nothing at the time.
- 19 **Q.** What did you do after the fact?
- 20 **A.** Later on that night, I knew where they lived at. And I
- 21 | went there and I called two of my friends up, Mr. Finnegan and
- 22 Mr. Raheem. And I gave them my tactical vest and -- that said
- 23 | "police" on it.
- 24 And I had -- I just told them to go inside and just knock
- 25 on the door and, you know, act like police and see if you can

- 1 | find the money. And they did.
- 2 And they came back out, and I waited for them. And we
- 3 drove off and I wound up splitting \$12,000 between the three of
- 4 us. I don't know what happened to the other 8, but I was just
- 5 | told it was 12,000.
- 6 Q. That Mr. Raheem you mentioned, is he a family member of
- 7 yours?
- 8 **A.** Yes.
- 9 Q. And is Mr. Finnegan a friend?
- 10 A. Yes. He was a childhood friend of mine from high school.
- 11 Q. As part of your cooperation with the United States, did
- 12 | you provide information about this episode?
- 13 **A.** Yes.
- 14 Q. Did you agree to testify at a trial --
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 | Q. -- involving those two individuals?
- 17 **A.** Yes.
- 18 Q. Who was the first sergeant you had in the
- 19 | Gun Trace Task Force?
- 20 A. Thomas Allers.
- 21 Q. Did you commit any crimes with him?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 **Q.** What -- can you give an example of a crime you committed
- 24 | with Thomas Allers.
- 25 **A.** There were -- unfortunately, there were quite a few. We

- 1 | just had a search warrant to where we went into one individual
- 2 house and he was counting money in -- upstairs in his room.
- 3 And we went there, and we did find a gun; however, we -- I
- 4 | found a large sum of cash. And later on that night, myself,
- 5 | along with Gondo and Allers, we split the money.
- 6 **Q.** Now, where was this house located?
- 7 **A.** I forget the exact street, but it was located in the
- 8 | Western -- Western District.
- 9 **Q.** Was the money in a drawer?
- 10 **A.** This one it was just outside, but --
- 11 **Q.** Did you search a home off Edmondson Avenue?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 **Q.** In which money was located in a drawer?
- 14 A. Yes. That one was a search warrant with Detective Gondo
- 15 at the time conducted in -- with a drawer filled with a lot of
- 16 cash. And I had told Allers at the time, who was our
- 17 | supervisor, that, "Hey, it's a lot of money in this drawer."
- And I remember him saying, "He won't notice if a bundle is
- 19 missing. So, you know, myself, we all took cash, a bundle
- 20 | with us. And Allers had took some -- Allers had his son with
- 21 him. And later on that night, we split the money up. And
- 22 | Allers, you know, told me that he had gave his son a portion of
- 23 it as well.
- 24 Q. So the money was split up between you, Gondo, Allers, and
- 25 his son?

- 1 **A.** Yes.
- 2 Q. Now, did you commit -- what did -- what is that crime?
- 3 What did you do?
- 4 A. We robbed him.
- 5 | Q. Did you commit that robbery while acting as a police
- 6 officer?
- 7 **A.** Yes.
- 8 Q. When did Sergeant Jenkins join the GTTF?
- 9 A. I believe sometime in June of 2016.
- 10 Q. Did you agree with Sergeant Jenkins to sell drugs and a
- 11 gun?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 Q. Can you tell us about that.
- 14 **A.** That was a time where we had did a vehicle stop in an
- 15 | apartment complex. I know it was myself, it was Gondo. I know
- 16 | Hersl was there. And -- was it -- and Wayne as well. But --
- 17 and we wound up going back to the person house who we had
- 18 stopped, and we searched the house and found some mar -- about
- 19 | a pound and a half of marijuana and a gun.
- 20 And, you know, I had asked Sergeant Jenkins at the time,
- 21 | you know, "What did you want to do? Should we get a warrant?"
- But he was like, "No. Just go ahead and, you know, get
- 23 | rid of it."
- And I said, "Okay." So that's when I had got with Gondo,
- 25 and Gondo called an associate of his. And we were able to sell

- 1 | the gun and the marijuana.
- 2 Q. And who had been involved in that search?
- 3 A. Well, the search, it was Hersl, myself, and Wayne in the
- 4 house.
- 5 Q. And was the gun and marijuana that was found in the house
- 6 turned in to Evidence?
- 7 **A.** No.
- 8 Q. Now, you've mentioned an episode with Sergeant Allers and
- 9 | now Sergeant Jenkins. Did you agree to testify in the trials
- 10 | against those two individuals?
- 11 **A.** Yes.
- 12 Q. Were you charged in Federal Court at the same time that
- 13 Daniel Hersl was charged?
- 14 **A.** Yes.
- 15 Q. When did you begin working with Hersl?
- 16 A. I began working with Hersl sometime in 2016. I can't
- 17 | recall the month, but could have been maybe March, April,
- 18 | somewhere around there, January, February. I don't -- I can't
- 19 recall, really.
- 20 **Q.** So early 2016?
- 21 **A.** Yes.
- 22 Q. Who was on the squad with you when you first began working
- 23 | with Hersl?
- 24 **A.** When I first began working with Hersl, it was myself,
- 25 Allers, John Clewell, and Gondo.

- 1 Q. What was the culture like in that squad?
- 2 **A.** It was laid back. We pretty much -- we came into work
- 3 | whenever we wanted to and left whenever we -- after we finished
- 4 | working. We got away with a lot of things, just as far as
- 5 reports or just a little bit of overtime here or there at that
- 6 time.
- 7 Q. You say, "We got away with a lot of things." What do you
- 8 mean by that?
- 9 **A.** Well, it was one time where -- it's actually in my plea
- 10 | agreement where I had admitted to taking money off of
- 11 | North Avenue with a handgun investigation, but we didn't find a
- 12 gun. But it led us into a drug investigation to where we wound
- 13 up going to an individual' house and drugs was recovered.
- And after the investigation, you could say, was over with,
- 15 Allers was like, "Hey, whatever happened to the drugs?"
- And Hersl was like, "Oh, I got rid of it."
- And then Allers was like, "Man, you guys going to get me
- 18 in trouble."
- 19 So basically that meant just, you know, the drugs weren't
- 20 turned in.
- 21 Q. So Hersl did not turn drugs in to Evidence?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 | Q. And Allers reacted by suggesting that you guys might get
- 24 | in trouble?
- 25 **A.** You guys are going to get me in trouble, just being that

- 1 he was a supervisor.
- 2 Q. What observations did you make about Hersl's work?
- 3 **A.** You know, just -- we were -- all of us were just
- 4 | nonchalant, really. We cut corners. We didn't really complete
- 5 | reports like we were supposed to. We took advantage of the
- 6 overtime.
- 7 | Q. In what ways did you take advantage of the overtime?
- 8 A. Well, for me personally, just saying that I was at work
- 9 when I wasn't at work.
- On one occasion I was told that -- on a few occasions I
- 11 was told that Hersl took off a whole month of work, working --
- 12 | while he was working on his house. So it was just -- just got
- 13 | away with a lot of stuff.
- 14 Q. Did Hersl tell you that he was working on his house?
- 15 **A.** Yes.
- 16 | Q. So he wasn't coming into work for a whole month?
- 17 A. That's what I was told.
- 18 **Q.** Was he getting paid for that time?
- 19 **A.** I believe so, yes.
- 20 **Q.** Now, while you were working under Sergeant Allers, what
- 21 was sort of your MO, so to speak, your method when stealing
- 22 money?
- 23 A. When I was working under Sergeant Allers, we would have a
- 24 | search warrant and we would go into the individual' house. And
- 25 | if there were drugs and guns and a large amount of money, of

- course, you know, we would submit the drugs and the gun;
 however, if there was cash, we would take -- well, you know, I
 would take a little bit of the cash and submit some of the
 money.
 - And that was just in case if the individuals were to complain that money was taken, it's kind of like them admitting to the drugs and gun.

And it wasn't right. But -- so it was just kind of like
covering myself and, you know, the squad as far as, you know,
well, if you say that money was taken, then you're admitting to
the drugs and guns, so the majority of the time, people won't,
you know, complain.

- 13 | Q. Would it look suspicious if you turned in no money?
- 14 A. Well, for me, I always wanted to turn some money in just
- to, you know, make it look like -- I just didn't want to take
- 16 everything. But if it -- sometimes, yeah, if you took all the
- money -- some people did take all the money, and that would
- 18 look suspicious.
- 19 Q. And so is that why you turned in a portion of the money?
- 20 **A.** Yes.

- 23 A. Well, I mean, with Jenkins, the -- we got a lot more
- 24 overtime. Like I said, as far as we didn't -- coming into work

- 7 Q. How, if at all, did it change when Wayne Jenkins and his guys came to the unit?
 - MS. WICKS: Objection, Your Honor; asked and answered.
 - THE COURT: We had gotten started on that about the overtime, so we can move on from there.
- 12 MR. HINES: Sure.

13 BY MR. HINES:

- 14 Q. With respect to the robberies, how did that change?
- 15 A. They increased a lot more, meaning as far as car stops,
- 16 search warrants, pretty much any individual that we came
- 17 across, if they had large sums of money, you know, money was
- 18 being taken.
- 19 Q. What did you observe regarding Mr. Taylor, Mr. Ward,
- 20 Mr. Hendrix when they had interactions with citizens?
- 21 A. Well, once -- like we did a lot of car stops throughout

- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 **Q.** Was the house searched?
- 14 **A.** Yes.
- 15 **Q.** Was anything found in the house?
- 16 A. There was drugs and guns found in the house, but there was
- 17 | no money. At the end of the warrant, at the end of the search,
- 18 Hersl came to me and just said, "Hey, did you get any money?"
- And I was just like, "No, I didn't get any money," which I
- 20 was just surprised because there was a substantial amount of
- 21 | drugs; and I figured, you know, it should be money in there,

- 1 Q. This was before the search in Westminster?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 Q. Ultimately, did you agree to get a search warrant?
- 4 **A.** Yes.
- 5 Q. What was the purpose of getting the search warrant?
- 6 A. It was for two reasons: One was I felt that -- I was
- 7 informed that he could be in possession of a handgun; but at
- 8 | the same time I believed that, you know, he had large sums of
- 9 money, from the observations. So it served two purposes.
- And with that being said, it was a possibility to where if

- 2 cash on him. And I had put the cash that he had on him in my
- 3 vest, and we placed him in handcuffs. And we drove them back

- 21 Q. Were Hersl and Clewell armed as well?
- 22 **A.** Yes.
- 23 | Q. And you said you put them in a vehicle?
- 24 **A.** Yes.
- 25 Q. What's the barn?

- 1 A. The barn is like a substation where the plainclothes unit
- 2 operate out of, like where we had extra offices -- office --
- offices at. It's right by the police academy.
- 4 Q. So is this like an off-site facility?
- 5 **A.** Yes.
- 6 Q. Are there markings on the buildings that it's a Baltimore
- 7 | Police Department facility?
- 8 A. Actually, I don't think so.
- 9 Q. So unless you know what it is --
- 10 MR. PURPURA: Objection. It's about to be leading.
- 11 BY MR. HINES:
- 12 Q. Did the Hamiltons say that they knew where you were taking
- 13 them?
- 14 A. I -- they didn't know where we was taking 'em. I -- no, I
- 15 don't think they knew.
- 16 Q. Did the Hamiltons give you their permission to take them
- 17 to the barn?
- 18 **A.** No.
- 19 **Q.** Did you interrogate the Hamiltons at the barn?
- 20 **A.** I was with Wayne Jenkins when he questioned -- when he
- 21 | interrogated Mr. Hamilton. Ms. Hamilton wasn't questioned.
- 22 | Q. Was anyone else present during the interrogation of
- 23 Mr. Hamilton?
- 24 **A.** Throughout the whole thing, I primarily was there; Gondo
- 25 | was there; and Hersl was there, but he was pretty much in and

- out of the office where we was talking to 'em. 1
- 2 Was Mr. Hamilton asked any questions about money? Q.
- Yes. Α. 3
- What was he asked? 4
- 5 We just asked, you know, "Did you have any guns or drugs Α.
- 6 or, you know, large sums of money?"
- And Mr. Hamilton said, you know, "I don't have any guns or 7 drugs there, but I have about \$40,000 in cash."
- What happened after he said he had about \$40,000 in cash 9
- at his house? 10

What happened after Gondo counted the \$20,000 in front of 1 Q. Hersl? 2 Well, it wasn't -- we -- well, I -- I wasn't sure -- I 3 wasn't going to take the money at the time, basically. We just 4 5 put the money back in the bag. Well, Gondo put the money back in the bag and put it back where -- back in the closet. 6 7 During that time, Wayne was calling Westminster to come out and conduct a search warrant. I had went downstairs to 8 talk to Wayne. And I was like, "Hey, what do you want to do? 9 Do you want to take the money or not?" 10 11 And Wayne was like, you know, "Go ahead. Take the money. And I said, "Okay." 12 13 So before Westminster police got there -- or the State Police, I went back upstairs. And I took the cash, and I 14 put it in the BPD vehicle we were driving. 15 16 What, if anything, did you say to Jenkins, Hersl, or Gondo about the money before you'd put it in the BPD vehicle? 17 At some point I did tell them that, you know, well, Wayne 18 already knew, Gondo -- because I came to him and said, "Hey, 19 you know, are you okay with this?" 20 And he was like, "Yeah." 21 And I was just like, "Hey, you know, I took it. 22 it." 23 And that was just basically so we all could be on the same 24 25 page when --
