Information about Proposed Europe Site Visits

Goals for London, England portion of the trip

England has a robust apprenticeship system but has a much lower participation rate than Switzerland. While there is a special apprenticeship program for young people ages 14-19, the England model also easily accommodates adult apprentices.

Specific goals include:

- See apprenticeship programs in action including traditional construction apprenticeships as well as apprenticeships in education, finance, computer science, and health care.
- Learn which occupations are best suited to apprenticeships.
- Understand how apprenticeships work in England with particular attention to the differences between apprenticeships for high school students and adults.
- Learn about how the system uses stackable credentials.
- Learn about the value proposition from the perspective of employers and employees.

The goals for Zurich, Switzerland portion of the trip

In Switzerland, compulsory schooling ends at 15. Students can go on to vocational education and training (VET) or high school leading to university. Approximately 2/3 of 15-year-olds attend VET and apprenticeships. The Swiss system offers stackable credentials. After two years, students earn a Federal VET certificate and, after three-four years, they earn the Federal VET Diploma. After finishing their certificates, students can take additional vocational training or enroll in college.

Specific goals include:

- Understand how apprenticeships can work for high school students.
- Visit a variety of apprentice programs to understand the breath of potential apprenticeships in Maryland.
- See apprenticeship programs focused on high school students and understand the value proposition for employers.
- Understand the dual track model that leads to stackable credentials and provides a route to university for apprentices who want to change career paths.
- Learn about the pros and cons of apprenticeships from the perspective of students and employers.
