The instructors will discuss issues such as witness memory, identification, recantation and simply deception. They will not always agree. The group will discuss traditional methods of getting to the truth and alternatives based on the latest research by the US High Value Detainee Interrogation Group Research Group. Prepare to use what you learn to review actual testimony or cases to further explore these issues.
Family Property and Income	7/23/2024	It's none of your business – oh, yes it is! – examination of business valuation issues in family law case.  Examination of a party's ownership in a business has

		broad impact on all financial issues in a divorce proceeding – alimony, child support and equitable distribution of marital property. Presentation of business-related issues is almost always reliant upon expert testimony. This course will look at the business-related issues from the perspective of both the business-owning spouse (who presumably has the dual goal of presenting a low valuation and minimal income from the business) and the non-owning spouse (seeking the highest possible valuation and substantial available income). The true picture usually involves examination of the data behind what is simply contained in income tax returns. The course will also highlight the important differences between taxable income and cash flow available for distributions –
		understanding the distinction between the two is essential in the court's analysis and to avoid falling into traps. The course will be presented by family law practitioners who regularly represent clients in these types of cases and an experienced business valuation expert. Through a variety of strategies—lecture, sample motions, interactive games, and quizzes— we will explore topics such as high volume and challenging motions, discuss tips and tricks for keeping civil motions at bay, and provide you with strategies for how your law clerk can effectively help you through it all. This class will also include content on evidentiary standards for motions in limine, motions for summary judgment, TROs/injunctions, and jurisdictional arguments.
Managing Your Queue (MDEC & Chambers Docket)	2/21/2023	Heavy dockets. Loads of chambers' work. How do you fit it all in and still have time to take a breath? Opinion Experts	5/23/2023	This course will review how judges handle opinion experts on the bench. Quite often a judge will qualify witnesses, encounter DNA expert testimony, and the myriad of expert testimony that often accompanies drug crimes with an emphasis on DWI/DUI cases.
Nuts & Bolts of Guardianship (Elder Abuse, Guardianship)	6/6/2023	Have you ever wanted to watch a contested guardianship case to see how its handled? What exactly is a guardianship? What are the procedures to

Participants will discuss communication techniques, role clarity, and shared values that promote teamwork, reduce conflict, and enhance daily operations. Join us to strengthen professional relationships and foster a culture of mutual support across Maryland's judicial system.

Getting to the Truth: Detecting Deception and Evaluating Evidence	4/6/2022	Every day, we are asked to make decisions based on words, appearances and other non-verbal cues and it seems that science is ever-changing. In this course we will explore different methods of evaluating all types of evidence, examining verbal and non-verbal cues and indicators of deception, and what is reliable and what is not. The instructors will discuss issues such as witness memory, identification, recantation and simply deception. The group will discuss traditional methods of getting to the truth and alternatives based on the latest research by the US High Value Detainee Interrogation Group Research Group. Prepare to use what you learn to review actual testimony or cases to further explore these issues.
Moral and Ethical Dilemmas in Judging & The Accessible Courtroom: Addressing the Needs of Persons with Disabilities	4/12/2022	What do you do when a jury finds a defendant guilty, but you think he is innocent? How do you handle a high-profile case where there is overwhelming public opinion that goes against your personal beliefs? How do you navigate the moral, ethical and human side of judging? Be part of a candid and open discussion about the "art" of judging and how best to handle difficult cases that raise moral and ethical dilemmas. This course will discuss how to consider the difficult parts of judging that you don't learn in law school or as a lawyer. We will discuss how to factor your own feelings about a case you are judging that may present difficult ethical and moral questions.
Mindfulness Meditation & Got Buoyancy? Resiliency Training for Judges	5/24/2022 12/6/2022	Judges and magistrates have to make decisions. They need undistracted, calm and open minds, despite seeing hundreds of similar cases and dealing with time pressures, conflicts, and difficult personalities. Developing a mindfulness meditation practice reduces stress and promotes focused, non-judgmental attention in the present moment. When you hear the word "meditation," you may have misconceptions. Join us for this class and experience meditation as a relaxing process with scientifically proven health and decision-making benefits. Mindfulness meditation practice is being taught to judges, lawyers, and law students across the country — and they are reaping the benefits. In its Path to Well Being Report, the Conference of Chief Judges, the ABA and others recommend the practice of mindfulness meditation.
Invisible Influences on the Administration of Justice	6/14/2022	Implicit bias is an often discussed, frequently misunderstood topic. This invisible influence exists within systems, organizations, and even within our minds. At all of these levels, bias can have an undue

		influence on the administration of justice. This interactive course will (1) explore the scientific foundations of implicit bias and related influences, and (2) guide judges through an exploration of the ways these influences can interfere with work in the courtroom and beyond. This session also will take a deeper dive into substantive areas where bias can have an impact on the administration of justice. Faculty will guide participants through an exploration of bias within (i) the criminal justice system, and (ii) the family law context. Participants do not need to have an understanding of bias in order to participate, but even those who have this foundation will find this session will build on prior knowledge. All participants should leave this course with enhanced understanding and practical takeaways for their work.
Emerging Issues (Civil, Criminal, Family)	6/28/2022	In this course, judges will discuss emerging, cutting- edge issues in criminal, civil, and family law that judges address, and the considerations that may be appropriate in resolving these issues. The course format encourages an interactive discussion about the resolution of these upcoming issues.
Opinion Writing	11/30/2022	Circuit Court judges often rule from the bench, but there are times when a written opinion is desirable and/or necessary. Perhaps you have heard a complex marital property case, an attorney grievance trial, a post-conviction matter, a declaratory judgment case, or some other complex matter. You have taken the case under advisement and now you must draft a written opinion, to include your fact findings and legal rulings. Our experienced faculty will focus on these types of cases and give you a framework for making this task easier for you and the opinion more clear to the parties (and the appeals court too!).
